Key figures in international affairs who spoke at Chatham House include Mahatma Gandhi, Winston Churchill, Willy Brandt, King Hussein of Jordan, and many more.

As a truly global resource, researchers will find every region of the world covered including: Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe, Middle East, Russia and Australasia.
